Then one by one, I let them go.


They meet their fate with man.





June Holy Days

4th June Trinity Sunday, celebrating our God who is Three Persons

Trying to explain the doctrine of the Trinity has kept many a theologian busy down the centuries. One helpful picture is to imagine the sun shining in the sky. The sun itself – way out there in space, and unapproachable in its fiery majesty – is the Father. The light that flows from it, which gives us life and illuminates all our lives, is the Son. The heat that flows from it, and which gives us all the energy to move and grow, is the Holy Spirit. You cannot have the sun without its light and its heat. The light and the heat are from the sun, are of the sun, and yet are also distinct in themselves, with their own roles to play.

The Bible makes clear that God is One God, who is disclosed in three persons: Father, Son (Jesus Christ) and Holy Spirit. For example:

Deuteronomy 6:4: 'Hear O Israel, The Lord our God, the Lord is one.'

Isaiah 45:22: 'Turn to me and be saved... for I am God, and there is no other.'

Genesis 1:1-2: 'In the beginning God created... and the Spirit of God was hovering...'

Judges 14:6: 'The Spirit of the Lord came upon him in power...'

John 1:1-3: 'In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was with God in the beginning. Through Him all things were made; without Him nothing was made that has been made.'

Luke 24:49 manages to squeeze the whole Trinity into one sentence. Jesus tells His disciples: 'I am going to send you what my Father has promised; but stay in the city until you have been clothed with power (the Holy Spirit) from on high.'

In other words, the sun eternally gives off light and heat, and whenever we turn to its brilliant light, we find that warmth and life are there as well.

Spiritual Disciplines: Simplicity

'Clutter is not just the stuff on your floor. It's anything that stands between you and the life you want to be living.' (Peter Walsh).

The spiritual discipline of simplicity is about living more simply and ensuring that possessions don't end up possessing us! Jesus expresses the heart of simplicity in the Sermon on the Mount (Matthew 6:19-34). He emphasises trusting God, not worrying about material things but 'seeking first his kingdom and his righteousness,' (Matthew 6:33).

'The Christian Discipline of simplicity is an inward reality that results in an outward life-style. Both the inward and the outward aspects of simplicity are essential.' (Richard Foster).

What happens in our hearts impacts the way we live our lives. But what does this look like in practice? Richard Foster lists a number of outward expressions of simplicity in his book *Celebration of Discipline*. These include:

- Buy things for their usefulness rather their status value eg cars, clothes.
- Reject anything that is addictive to us eg drinks, TV, social media.
- Develop the habit of giving things away to others who need them.
- Don't get caught up with buying the latest electronic gadget.
- Develop a deeper appreciation of creation.

How can we simplify our life?

Step 1: Find something that needs simplifying, eg decluttering the house or limiting the time consuming TV or social media. It's about stopping whatever prevents us from making the kingdom of God our top priority.

Step 2: Take time to reflect and write down how we will embrace simplicity in that area eg. stop using the phone one hour before bed and keeping it outside the bedroom.

Step 3: Ask someone to keep us accountable!

'Always remember the essence of Christian holiness is simplicity and purity: one design, one desire: entire devotion to God.' (John Wesley)

UK foodbanks busier than ever

More food parcels were given out in the UK this past year than ever before. During December 2022, an emergency food parcel was handed out the equivalent of every eight seconds.

These are the most recent figures from the Trussell Trust, which supports more than 1,300 foodbanks in the UK.

In all, the charity says it gave out nearly three million food parcels between April 2022 and April 2023. More than one million of these were for children.

These three million parcels from the charity's foodbanks represent a 37-per-cent increase in England on 2021. And more than 760,000 people used a foodbank for the first time, which is up more than one third in 2021-22.

Soaring inflation and energy costs have driven the increase in demand. The charity reports an unprecedented rise in the number of employed people using their foodbanks, because they are "no longer able to balance a low income against rising living costs."

The problem now, says the trust, is that food donation levels are not keeping up with the need. "This is putting us under a lot of strain."

What makes June so special

June is the month of light – the month of the summer solstice, when millions of people in northernmost Europe stay out late to enjoy the sight of the midnight sun. To have light and glory where there is usually darkness is something we celebrate, we welcome.

In John 9 Jesus said: “I am the light of the world.” He wasn’t comparing Himself to the summer solstice, but preaching at a Jewish occasion which celebrated light every bit as much. It was the Feast of Tabernacles (John 7:14), which was a celebration not only of God’s provision of water, but also of the light of God’s presence with the Israelites in the wilderness.

During the Feast of Tabernacles there was a joyful celebration. The priests would light four huge lamps in the Court of Women. The flames would reach as high as the temple walls and would provide a light that could be seen all throughout Jerusalem. Men of deep piety would dance throughout the night for the entire week of celebrating. A choir, accompanied by an orchestra of instruments, would sing psalms like Psalm 27, which declare “The Lord is my light and my salvation.”

At the height of this grand celebration, the Lord Jesus had the temerity to stand and say that HE was the light that was foreshadowed by the light for the Israelites in the wilderness.

The Jewish leaders were furious, and tried to stone Him to death. Jesus did not fight back, He simply illustrated His claim to be the Light of the World by immediately giving sight to a man born blind. (John 9).

In the 20 centuries since then, the Word of God, when it is proclaimed, has drawn people out of the darkness and into the light of Jesus. The Word is, as the psalmist said, “a lamp to my feet and a light for my path” (Psalm 119:105). David said, “In your light we see light” (Psalm 36:9b). Today, by the light of the Word of God, we can see Jesus as He is: truly the Light of the World.

Here is a glimpse into our past courtesy of David Fearnley

BISPHAM HALL, BILLINGE : WATERLOO, JUNE 18, 1815, MONUMENT

On June 18th 1815 the war between Britain and France ended with the defeat of Napoleon at Waterloo, 10 miles from Brussels, and his final exile to St. Helena where he died in 1821. Britain had been at war with revolutionary France since 1793 and constantly under the threat of a French invasion.

The people of Ashton responded to the government's call for towns to raise volunteer forces in case of invasion. In 1798 Sir William Gerard, of Garswood New Hall, raised the Ashton Volunteer Cavalry of 60 cavalrymen and in 1804 Captain William Peet, the owner of a hinge-making business in Ashton, raised the Loyal Ashton Volunteer Infantry of 137 men.

Lady Gerard gave speeches against the evil Napoleon who had executed the legitimate king of France and presented the colours or flags to both regiments in elaborate celebrations within the grounds of Garswood New Hall. The estate grounds were open to the public and there was a firework display in the evening. There are no records of anyone from the Ashton area and serving in the regular army having fought at Waterloo.

From Wigan John Holding, a weaver, had joined the army in 1805, aged 22, and had fought with No. 1 Company at Waterloo. He was discharged from the army in 1818 with a pension of 6d (2p) a day. James Shakelady, of Lathom, a nailor served with No. 8 Company and was killed at Waterloo aged 30. He was one of the 50,000 killed at Waterloo.

In Britain there are only 18 memorials to the victory at the battle of Waterloo, June 18th 1815. These include memorials inside Waterloo Station, London and Edinburgh Castle and the Waterloo Vase, 18 feet high & weighing 40 tons in Buckingham Palace Gardens, London. In all of northern England there are only 2 memorials, one in Cheshire, in a church near Northwich and the other at Bispham Hall, Crank Road, Billinge.

The Bispham Hall memorial was erected in 1816 by brothers John & Robert Holt, the owners of the Hall, in the grounds of their estate. The memorial is a tall sandstone obelisk/steeple with a ball finial at the top and standing on a square base.

The inscription commemorates the Duke of Wellington and the victors of Waterloo. Around the top of the base is the inscription "England Confesses On That Day Each Man Did His Duty". Around the bottom of the base "Spare the Conquered and Conquer the Proud".

There are inscriptions in oval shaped areas on each of the four faces of the monument. On the West face "To The Most Noble Illustrious Arthur Duke Of Wellington and the Brave Heroes of Britain and the Continent who under His Auspicious Genius and Command so Gloriously Accomplished the Downfall of Tyranny and the Restoration of Liberty to Europe on the Plains of Waterloo June 18th AD1815".

On the South face "The British – Picton, Hill, Uxbridge, Gordon, Somerset, Ponsonby, F. Somerset, Cameron, Ellis, Maitland, Pack, Halket, Kemp, Cooke, Byng, Grant, Clinton, Alton, Adam, Barnes, Delancy, Vivian".

On the East face "The Continentals – Brunswick, Orange, Blucher, Bulow, Trip, Vanhope, Domberg, Ompteda, Pozzo di Borgo".

On the North face "To those who fell, The immortal Heroes in whose latest breath, Glowed the patriot feeling strong in death, But that moment was in all the past, Save my country heaven, was your last. Dulce et Decorum Est Pro Patria Mori".(It is sweet and right to die for your country).

I am constantly made aware that even three years since the hub was formed some people are still not clear on the structure or how we manage our Church or its finances. As I keep repeatedly informing everyone each Church still manages its own finances. As in the past we have to have the agreement of PCC for any major expenditure.

Each Church has a Parish Share to pay to the Deanery and St Aidan's is £4,673 which unfortunately we struggle to meet.

Previous years arrears are carried forward and we have a substantial debt owed for Deanery Share. This year we have managed to pay January, February, March and April in full. On average our income works out at around £3k per month but earlier this year we have received some rebates that have helped us to meet our commitments. Once utility bills and some other direct bills are paid whatever is left goes to Parish Share. The income comes from the regular giving from our parishioners and the one off donations that we receive, usually in memory of loved ones.

If anyone wishes to give one off donations and, if you are a tax payer and haven't previously filled out a gift aid form, then please complete one as this means we can claim 25p in every pound from the Inland Revenue.

- If you are a regular giver then it helps us enormously if you pay through the Parish Giving Scheme which means we receive the tax back monthly rather than annually.
- We also have a card machine in Church which is used regularly.
- One off donations can be made through Parish Giving and our Stewardship Account which can be accessed through our Facebook page and website,
- Cheques can be made payable to St Aidan's Church

Memorials

Names of deceased loved ones whose ashes have been interred in the memorial garden can be inscribed on the large granite memorial stone. Entries on the stone cost £200. If the partner or other relative wishes to reserve an adjacent space this can also be arranged, the cost being the same as the original entry and with no further charge when the inscription is completed. In order to ensure that the reserved line is kept the date of birth of the person for whom it is reserved will be added. The fee/s must be paid before any inscription is added.

St Aidan's Remembrance Book

Applications for Entries to the Remembrance Book can be made by filling in the request form, which gives full details of how to go about it.

Fees for entries cost £10.00. Forms are obtainable from the back of Church with details of what to do and who to return the form to.

The Opened Book shows 4 days dates per view and the pages are turned on a regular basis according to that day's date. The Book is on Display in the Glass topped Cabinet, in the Prayer corner.
