



And this is His field.


He planted, He will give growth

# Letter from Eth

Greetings from a field in North Wales!

I decided rather than write this letter from our holiday, wherever that may be, I would do it from our annual camp. As I am sure you all know St Peters BB and GB have a long tradition of taking our young people to camp.

We are in a field, on a farm in Caerwys North Wales, somewhere we have been a good few times now. It's a happy place for us mainly because the farmer and his wife make us so very welcome. The farmer's wife is the Church Warden at the local church and is a welcoming lady who readily smiles and laughs with us and greets us with warm hugs.

The week on camp starts on Friday when we arrive with all our worldly goods on a large wagon. We unload a wooded sectional cook house, a shower, a marquee and various sizes of tents. A large industrial cooker a boiler a grill and various pots and pans which make up the cooking facilities (for further details speak to Sue and Mike Fulford!)

More than that we unload a whole host of memories that will be shared with the young people during the week as we chat and share time with them. We start each day with a short service around our flag, this is a time to spend time with God before we start the day, for me it is an important time. Over the years I have looked around the group gathered and seen people who we first took to camp as youngsters and who have grown into the adults they are today. Each with skills and talents that they use to benefit not just Brigade but the wider community.

God has blessed us with so much when we camp, Wales is such a beautiful place. On one camp a few years ago we went up Snowdon, Yr Wyddfa, the views going up the mountain were stunning and brought tears to my eyes (that could also have been the fact that it was a long long climb!!) Wherever we look around us we see God's glory in the countryside and it reminds us of His great love for us and his.

In Wales we are never far from a hill and it always brings me back to the wonderful Psalm 121:

I look up to the mountains; does my strength come from mountains? No, my strength comes from God, who made heaven, and earth, and mountains. He won't let you stumble, your Guardian God won't fall asleep. Not on your life! Israel's Guardian will never doze or sleep. God's your Guardian, right at your side to protect you— Shielding you from sunstroke, sheltering you from moon stroke. God guards you from every evil, he guards your very life. He guards you when you leave and when you return, he guards you now, he guards you always.

This is such a wonderful psalm of encouragement and praise and fits our camp perfectly. God has always kept us safe, He has always been there to protect and He has never let us down. We have encountered so many things on camp, it has never been an easy ride. We have had times of joy and delight and times of utter, utter devastation and sadness. But through all the years we have gone to camp Our Lord has been with us, He has never left us He has been our strength and our guide, even when we haven't realised it! We also have a church family who support us prayerfully.

So we say thank you to Him for His love and protection, we thank Him for the skills of the campers, for their never ending enthusiasm and fellowship, for the friendships we have forged and the fellowship we share. But most of all we thank Him for "guarding us when we leave and when we return, he guards us now, he guards us always."

The coming of Rudolph the red-nosed reindeer

Some 75 years ago, on 1st September 1949, the Christmas song Rudolph the Red-Nosed Reindeer was released. It was sung by the American movie-star and singer Gene Autry, nicknamed the "Singing Cowboy".

The song was adapted from a poem/story written by Robert L May for a children's colouring book: it was an assignment given him by his employers, the Chicago-based Montgomery Ward retail group. It was published in 1939, and 2.4 million copies were distributed free in its first year.

May initially considered the names Rollo or Reginald for his 'ugly duck' reindeer, but eventually settled on Rudolph. Concerned about how to make the reindeer distinctive, he was looking out of his office window when a thick fog blocked his view. This gave him the idea for Rudolph's bright red nose, enabling Santa to see where he was going.

Robert May's four-year-old daughter was used as a sounding board while he created the story, but it was initially rejected, partly because of the unfortunate associations of a red nose with chronic drunkenness at the time. However, May's friend and colleague, Denver Gillen, drew 'cute reindeer', which persuaded the managers to go for the idea.

The story-poem was turned into a song by May's brother-in-law, Johnny Marks. Several popular singers rejected it, but Gene Autry took it on, and his recording reached No 1 on the Billboard chart for pop singles in the week of Christmas 1949. It sold 2.5 million copies in the first year. Up to the 1980s it was the second best-selling record of all time.

The United States Postal Service issued a series of postage stamps featuring Rudolph on 6th November 2014.

# 14th September Holy Cross Day



On Holy Cross Day the Church celebrates the Cross as a symbol of triumph, as the sign of Christ's victory over death. Holy Cross Day goes right back to 14 September 335, and we have the mother of a Roman Emperor to thank for it.

Helena was a devout Christian, and after her son, Constantine, was converted, they agreed that she should travel from Rome to Israel, to seek out the places of special significance to Christians.

Of course, much of Jerusalem had been destroyed by the Romans around 135 AD. But even so, Helena finally located what she believed to be the sites of the Crucifixion and of the Burial (and modern archaeologists think she may well be correct). The sites were so close together that she built one large church over them - the Church of the Holy Sepulchre.

That church, built in honour of the Cross, was dedicated on 14 September 335.

The sign of the Cross has been used by Christians since early times. Tertullian, writing his De Corona (3:2) around AD 211, noted that Christians seldom did anything significant without making the sign of the Cross.

What is its significance? Well, people often put their initials or some sort of personal mark on something to show that it belongs to them. The Cross is the personal mark of our Lord Jesus Christ, and we mark it on ourselves as a sign that we belong to him. Even in the book of Revelation, we read that the servants of God are 'sealed' or 'marked' on their foreheads as a sign that they are His.

A preacher once put it this way: if you were explaining to someone how to make a cross, you would say: "Draw an I." That is you, standing before the Lord, saying, 'here I am'. Then cancel that vertical stroke with a horizontal stroke – as if to say: "Lord, I abandon my self-will and make You the centre of my life instead. I abandon myself to Your love and service."

On Holy Cross Day, we recall Jesus' wonderful promise: "And when I am lifted up,1 will draw all men unto me." (John 12:32)

# 18th September St Joseph of Copertino, the awkward saint

Joseph of Copertino (1603 – 63) should be the patron saint of all awkward people who mean well, but who drive those around them to distraction – especially their church leaders.

Joseph began life in a garden shed, because his father had sold the house to pay debts. Then he grew up wandering about open-mouthed – his mother despised him and called him 'the Gaper'.

Young Joseph's intense devotion to God led him to try and join the Capuchin monks – but he drove them crazy: forgetting to do what he was told, dropping piles of plates on the kitchen floor, and neglecting to tend the all-important kitchen fire. He was finally accepted by the Franciscans as a servant, and grew so religiously fervent that he was accepted as a novice in 1625, and ordained a priest in 1628.

As a priest he was devout, but apt to do anything – much to the irritation of his superiors. One problem was his repeated levitations, of which there were 70 reported instances. The most spectacular stories are of his flying to images placed high above the altars and helping workmen to erect a Calvary Cross 36 feet high by lifting it into place while he was hanging in mid-air himself. Such feats earned him the name of 'the Flying Friar' by admiring locals, but gave his superiors headaches. They were also disturbed by his habit of going into states of ecstasy, from which nothing could wake him.

Joseph's reputation for flying about and for occasional ecstasy drew the crowds: they were all eager to see what would happen next. What did happen next was that his superiors kept him in virtual isolation for many years, eager to contain this intensely emotional and erratic priest. In 1767 he was canonised, not for his levitations, but for his extreme patience and humility.

# **Reflecting Faith: Arts and Crafts Churches**

Originally, the theology behind church building was to build church buildings on higher land, so that people would have to lift their heads to look upon them; with the tower or spire giving it extra height.

This was reflecting the faith of lifting our eyes to God and recognising our place in His Creation – and yet He still came to earth for us.

Often a clock would have been placed on the tower or spire for the local people who would not have had personal time-pieces, and again they would have lifted their eyes heavenward to see it. The clock might have chimed, or would have been connected with the church bells to enable illiterate people to know the time.

There were 612 Commissioner churches built in the early 1800's, when society was becoming industrialised, and folk were moving away from rural life and into towns.

By the middle of that century the Arts and Crafts Movement was well under way, and church buildings were being 'targeted'.

Between 1884 and 1918 there were about 5000 churches built in the UK, of which around 350 can be identified as Arts and Crafts churches. Much depended on the Patron of the church and their generosity.

In East and North Yorkshire there are a set of 17 churches which were restored or built by the local patron(s) – father and son of the Sykes Family of Sledmere House – between 1866 and 1913. They say they are unparalleled elsewhere in Britain.

### This month:

Have a look at a church near you and see if you can see the influence in it of this Arts and Crafts Movement. It was intended to make buildings less austere, more decorative, more 'emotive'. Do you think it does?

## Did you know...?

The Rt Rev Timothy Dudley - Smith is a clergyman who recently died. He was Suffragan Bishop of Thetford in Norwich Diocese and before that was Archdeacon of Norwich. He is well known for writing hymns, upwards of 450, his most well known being 'Tell Out My Soul" and "Lord For The Years', the latter being written on a train journey from Nottingham to London. These two hymns are often sung and enjoyed by the congregation at Holy Trinity.

40 years ago, on 10th Sept 1984 that British geneticist Alec Jeffreys discovered genetic fingerprinting, also known as DNA profiling. It allowed criminals to be identified from hair, blood, or sweat left at crime scenes. It also allowed families to trace their lineages or determine the paternity of children.

21st September is St Matthew's day. He was also known as Levi and was a Jew who collected taxes for the Romans at Capernaum in Galilee. Here Jesus met him and called him to be an apostle (Luke 5:27-28). Venerated as the author of the Gospel which highlights Jesus' role as Messiah and underlines the presence of the Kingdom of God in the Church.

400 years ago, on 10th Sept 1624 that Thomas Sydenham, English physician, was born. He became known as the 'father of English medicine'. His textbook on medicine became the standard medical textbook in England for the next 200 years.

On a calm, windless day, it can be frustrating to be in a sailboat. Your sails are ready to go, but with no wind and only calm waters, you aren't going anywhere!

Any entry must be paid for at the rate when the stone-mason does the work. We will advise you of this charge beforehand. You may also arrange for a line to be reserved below this inscription for a loved one by paying a £50 deposit. When the time comes to fill in the reserved line the charge at that time will apply less the £50 deposit. The fee must be paid before any inscription is added.

Unfortunately, we have had to make this change because rising costs have left the Church having to pay a shortfall of the fee charged at the time a second line was requested.
