December can feel like chaos - lots of social events, services, Christmas presents to buy, never-ending to-do lists and the pressure to create the perfect Christmas. But in the midst of this chaos, our church can offer an opportunity to find peace during this busy time.

The Church of England's theme for Advent and Christmas 2024 is '*Follow the Star: Calm and Bright*' drawing on the world-famous carol, Silent Night.



You might like to download a new app available from the Church of England which will allow you to access daily reflections to inspire, equip and encourage you in your everyday faith. They will include daily reflections for Advent and the Christmas period. 'Everyday Faith' is now available to download for iOS and Android. If you already have the Watch & Pray app installed, you will automatically get the update.

The idea for Everyday Faith is twofold. The app forms part of one of the Church of England's objectives of missional discipleship: "To become a church of missionary disciples where all God's people are free to live the Christian life, wherever we spend our time Sunday to Saturday." But the app also responds to overwhelming demand from users for an app that delivers inspirational reflections year-round rather than focussed on seasonal content during Lent and Advent. They wanted to create a space encouraging Christians to grow in their faith daily.

The app will provide you with carefully curated daily reflections, including selected Bible readings, a simple prayer to prepare you for the day ahead, and thoughts based on that week's theme.

December 1st is Advent Sunday. We start a new liturgical year. A new advent Candle will be used at our services in December. Advent means 'coming' when we remember the coming of Jesus at Bethlehem, and look forward to his coming in power at the end of time.

Safeguarding – a letter from Bishop John[†]

Over a week has passed since the Archbishop of Canterbury resigned and many in the Church of England reflected on their safeguarding practices in the light of the Makin Review. Last Friday's bulletin restated our collective shock at the details of the report and our desire to keep survivors at the front of our thoughts and prayers. It also highlighted mine and Dean Sue's commitment to encourage the best possible safeguarding culture for our diocese.

When something like this occurs, we have to look at what we can learn from and improve on. We have a strong platform of good practice to build on. Our safeguarding team has developed robust policies and procedures which are often shared with other dioceses as best practice examples. I have regular meetings with Andy Holmes, our Diocesan Safeguarding Officer, and am encouraged to hear the work that the majority of our parishes are doing is good.

We cannot and must not be complacent and I need you, as ministers with oversight in your parishes, to ensure that your parish is doing all it can to follow best practice. You can find what you need at <u>https://liverpoolcofe.org/safeguarding-matters/</u>

Following best practice means you need to

1) adhere to the robust policies and procedures the safeguarding team have put in place. I have asked Andy to tell me of any places where this is not the case or is being resisted so that I can take appropriate action.

2) make sure that all activities are appropriately risk assessed.

3) carry out safer recruitment for any roles that are offered in the parish. You can find that guidance here https://liverpoolcofe.org/safeguarding-matters/safer-recruitment-for-parishes-and-churches/

4) carry out all training on a regular basis. You must complete your training every three years. This is not an excessive request and we know many people may have had safeguarding training with other bodies they engage with however the church is a unique place. Your leadership, and the leadership of the PCC is vital in establishing the safe churches we all want. Myself and the diocesan safeguarding team are committed to the best possible practice and I am aware of the tireless commitment of so many of you, your PCCS and Parish Safeguarding Officers. I thank you for that. We are horrified by the details of the Smyth report and would not want a repeat of that. Changing the culture through committing to and following the 4 actions above will go a long way to making sure we have safer churches in the Diocese of Liverpool. +John

You may like to be aware that at St Aidan's we do adhere to the robust policies and procedures the Diocesan safeguarding team. We were inspected by them earlier this year. All our volunteers complete the safeguarding training and documentation every 3 years.
